❖ Curriculum Development

The suggestions offered by industrialists and alumni are taken into account for curriculum development to make the syllabi of all the UG, PG and M.Phil. programmes to meet the requirements in line with social changes and demands. The guidelines of UGC, TANSCHÉ and MKU are followed in letter and spirit to tone up the quality of curriculum planning and development. Add-on Certificate and Diploma Courses are offered to UG students to impart the required skills to make them job ready. The curriculum pays attention to the courses imparting entrepreneurial skills to qualify the students for self-employment. The curriculum incorporates global contemporary concepts and issues. It is designed to orient the students to apply their skills earned to real life situation.

❖ Teaching and Learning

Learner-centric teaching and learning is put in practice in the institution. Students are given the concepts underlying the particular course in advance of the class to ensure their active participation and interaction to make the teaching-learning experience effective. Topics for student's seminar are given well in advance for their presentation with the objective of improving their academic skills. Activity based teaching strategies like debates, discussions, role plays, pair and group activities, problem solving activities foster critical thinking and life skills. The students are given freedom to choose their Non-Major Elective courses. Field study is practised, wherein the students work collaboratively. Institution sponsored seminars are organized to get the students enlightened in their fields by utilizing the expertise of the academicians of other institutions. Feedback through internal tests helps both students and teachers understand students' learning level. Participatory teaching-learning process is facilitated.

❖ Examination and Evaluation

Continuous Internal Assessment system is practised to gauge student learning progress and quality of teaching. Internal Test Committee is set up every year for the conduct of centralized internal tests as per the schedules given in college calendar prepared by the IQAC. Multiple choice questions are asked both in the internal tests and the summative examinations. Other assessment methodologies adapted like classroom quizzes, seminars and presentations are taken. Outcome based assessment is in place in lab skill evaluation, in formative and summative examinations. Scrutiny board consisting of external experts is constituted to scrutinize the question papers of the summative examinations. The schedule for the summative examinations is prepared by the office of the Controller of Examinations and the same is put up on college notice board and the website well in advance. Schemes of valuation are prepared for the summative examinations for quality

<p>evaluation. The viva voce are conducted for projects and practical. On completion of the evaluation work, the results are presented to the Awards Committee. The results of the summative examinations are published on the college website within twenty days from the last date of the summative examinations.</p>
<p>❖ Research and Development</p> <p>Five Post Graduate Departments have been upgraded to Research Departments. The institution insists on teachers to pursue Ph.D research programmes and to take up research projects from various funding agencies. The teachers with Ph.D are asked to apply for guideship from the university to guide scholars towards Ph.D. The teachers are encouraged to publish research articles, present research papers in various conferences, to become members in various research committees in other institutions, and to be on the panel of examiners of Ph.D thesis. Research oriented projects are given to students to impart research sensibility.</p>
<p>❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation</p> <p>Library functions in an exclusive building providing peaceful and conducive atmosphere for effective reading. A computerised catalogue is available for the books stocked in the general library. Study materials, comprising e-books and other study materials like open books, texts and notes downloaded from the internet are available in the library. The institution has well equipped seminar hall. Each PG department has department library. Separate grounds for Volley ball, Foot Ball and other sports events available.</p>
<p>❖ Human Resource Management</p> <p>The College is governed by the effective managing system involving Heads of various departments to coordinate various committees and co-curricular activities for the effective functioning of the institution. Deans of Academic affairs for Arts and Science are appointed once in two years. Two senior-most teachers are nominated to the Governing Council and the Management Body. Various committees are formed for effective utilization of human resources. Teaching and non-teaching staff are appointed as and when the vacancy arises. Appointments are made based on UGC guidelines and the norms of Government of Tamil Nadu. Faculty Development Programs are organised for teaching staff. Training programs are organised for Non-Teaching staff. Teachers are deputed to undergo Faculty Development Programs organized by other academic institutions. Substitute teaching staff are appointed for the teachers deputed under FDP and going on maternity leave. Director of Self-financing Programmes leads the self-financing stream.</p>
<p>❖ Industry Interaction / Collaboration</p> <p>Industrialists are included in the Boards of Studies and Academic Council of the Institution to make use of their expertise for enriching the curricula in line with Industrial requirements. Industrial visits are arranged by the Departments to expose students to the Industrial work culture.</p>

The applications of the selected candidates are verified with the documentary evidence. They are processed and submitted to the Principal for admission.</p>
