#### Feedback Obtained

Students Satisfaction Survey was conducted offline from the last week of March, 2018 covering students' feedback on curriculum, teaching and evaluation. Alumni feedback was also obtained offline on the Graduation Day, covering their feedback on admission procedures, learning resources, teachers' counselling etc. Sampling method was adopted for eliciting students' feedback. Census Method was adopted for gathering Alumni Feedback. The data collected from both the Students and the Alumni have been analyzed using percentage analysis and measures of central tendency. Maintenance is in place on a regular pattern to ensure the good working condition of Lab Equipment, Computers, other Peripherals, and Generator etc. Regular inspection is effected to ensure the hygiene of water tanks, toilets other facilities. Labs maintain stock register, and registers for consumable materials. Every academic year witnesses the Library Committee comprising teachers under the convenorship of the librarian, engaged in taking stock of the books available to prepare a report of books issued, returned or missed. The departments are invited with a list of books required in respect of revised syllabi for the librarian to place order. Copies of M. Phil dissertation of various disciplines are placed in the library for the reference of the students. Stock verification of articles in all domains including table and chairs is done by different Committees comprising teachers to replace the damaged ones to ensure infrastructure fulfillment. Sports committee extend their support to the Director of Physical Education to conduct various sports games for male female students. RO facility is made available to provide purified drinking water to the students. Personal security and safety on the campus is ensured with the installation of CCTV cameras. Library is kept open till 4 p.m. and browsing facility is offered to the students in the library. Lapses in network connections are redressed at the earliest. Civil electrical works are paid periodic attention.

Curriculum Development	Curriculum Development has been exercised for UG, PG and M. Phil Programmes in response to the suggestions and recommendations placed by the industrialists and the alumni in appropriate to the contemporary needs and demands. The guidelines of UGC, TANSCHE and Madurai Kamaraj University find an important role in the curriculum planning and development. A computerised catalogue is of much help to trace the book stocked in the general library. The net facility available helps the students with E- material and E-journal of various disciplines. Internet downloaded study materials like E-books, E texts and notes are made available for the use of the students. An exclusive rack holding books for competitive examinations is of much use for the job aspirant students to prepare for the competitive exams. Each PG department is blessed with department library for the academic benefit of the students of the respective programmes. There is well furnished Seminar Hall in the institution. Separative facilities for volleyball, foot ball, badminton are available.
