To cater to the needs in

Library books are digitally catalogued with the application of FoxPro to facilitate easy access for the students and teachers to the books selected. Claim of staff salary has been made in EPayroll created using FoxPro. Biometric system of exercising and recording the attendance of the members of staff has been introduced. Regular attendance of the members of staff has been scientifically maintained to make the preparation of Payroll effective. All the examination related tasks including collection of CIA marks, inviting the services of the question setters, and examiners and publication of results have been effected through wellconstructed Management Information System. IQAC executes its task of collecting all the stellar data pertaining to the academic activities and Association engagements of the departments, distinguished achievements of the teachers and the students with authentic evidence materials for further process. The record of AISHE prepared by IQAC carries the statistical entry of the particulars related to the students. Excel format is widely used in maintaining most of the records of the institution. Required information are uploaded on the portal of Public Financial Management System (PFMS) for getting government grants.

Feedback Obtained

Students Satisfaction Survey was conducted offline from the first week of March, 2020 covering students' feedback on curriculum, teaching, evaluation and infrastructure. Sampling method was adopted for students' feedback. Alumni feedback was also obtained offline, covering their feedback on admission procedures, learning resources, teachers' counselling etc. Census Method was adopted for gathering Alumni Feedback. From the analysis of the feedback received from the Students, Alumni and Teachers (External Examiners), it was observed that these stakeholders recorded their appreciation and satisfaction towards the quality of teaching, fee structure, evaluation method, curriculum and programmes offered by the institution. Being encouraged by the feedback of the Students, Alumni and Teachers, the administration and the teachers were motivated to rededicate themselves to better the qualities in all respects. The data collected from these stakeholders have been analysed using percentage analysis and measures of central tendency (Arithmetic mean). Pie chart has been prepared for immediate references.
